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Meru, Tharaka Nithi bracing for 2027 political storm

eru politics are never dull, and the 2027 governor's election is quickly becoming one of the most violent in Kenya. A county that has seen impeachments, party chaos, and defections now sets the stage for a five-way battle.

The incumbent: Isaac Mutuma M'Ethingia

Deputy Speaker of the Senate and a loyal UDA ally, Kathuri has not declared but looms large. His entry could split Imenti's swing vote and complicate UDA's arithmetic.

Alliances brewing

Speculation is rife of a Munya–Kawira pact, which could redraw Tigania and Buuri politics. At the same time, a recent picture of Kathuri and Linturi together has fueled talk of a possible UDA–DCP alliance — one that could combine Imenti's swing power with Igembe's miraa vote.

The bottom Line

With Mutuma, Munya, Linturi, Kawira, and perhaps Kathuri in the mix — as well as rumors of other combinations — Meru is holding its breath for nothing less than a political tsunami.

Maara: The current governor's birthplace.

Chuka/Igamba Ng'ombe: The economic powerhouse that boasts the most voters.

Tharaka: The region making the strident case, "it's our turn."

It makes 2027 both a succession war and an argument of regional equity.

The big question

Will Tharaka Nithi electors vote along regional equilibrium, giving Tharaka its first governor? Or will they vote along political experience and networking, giving the sitting Maara and Chuka/Igamba Ng'ombe

Either way, with Murugara, Susan, Kareke, and Prof. Njoka all in the race, the 2027 governor's election is going to be nothing short of a political earthquake.



The Democratic Change Party (DCP) has reaffirmed its rising influence in Mt. Kenya East, with leaders in Meru, Tharaka Nithi, and Embu counties assuring residents that the party is firmly positioned as the people's choice ahead of the next General Election.

Speaking during a grassroots mobilization drive in Meru town, Meru County DCP Coordinator Patrick Muriungi emphasized that the party is ready to provide a strong and united platform for the region.

Ura Gate cultural festival: celebrating heritage and unity in Tharaka Nithi

Por the people of Tharaka Nithi and neighboring communities, the Ura Gate Cultural Festival is no mere annual gathering.

It is a revival of heritage, a bridge between the past and present, and an economic shorten travel distances — it opened up opportunities for cultural exchange and economic growth.

Held in the dry months of August-September, the festival arrives when harvests are done, skies are clearer, and Conservation stands at the heart. The communities around Meru National Park — including Tharaka people and riparian groups living near the gate — use the festival to highlight the importance of wildlife protection, awareness against poaching, and fighting human-wildlife conflicts. Game drives are part of the programme, giving both locals and visitors tangible encounters with nature. Kenya Wildlife Service and others often partner in these efforts.

Tourism is taking note.

Once ranked among Kenya's top cultural festivals, Ura Gate pulls in visitors who are keen to experience culture, scenery, nature, and community all in one place. Local hotels, home stays, restaurants, and craftspeople see increases in business, and regional recognition grows.

Yet, for all its vibrance, the festival's future depends on more than enthusiasm. Stable funding, institutional backing, legal anchoring, and protection from political whim are crucial if the heritage is to be preserved. Local groups have highlighted that in years when the festival is delayed or less funded, much of the momentum — especially among youth, dancers, artisans — is lost.

But the mood among communities is hopeful. With each edition, Ura Gate grows in scale and reach. It is a symbol of identity, unity, and potential — not just of Tharaka Nithi, but of how culture can drive conservation, tourism, economic empowerment, and national cohesion.

Abuse of alcohol and substances remains one of the largest public health issues in Meru County. Lives are ruined, the future of the youth is lost, and society is burdened with reduced productivity and rising health complications. In addition to addiction, untreated and undiagnosed mental illnesses such as depression, anxiety, and bipolar disorder continue to claim lives in secrecy and silence.

"Most people are not going to come for assistance for fear of stigma or cost of treatment," according to one of the Centre's therapists. "Harmony was created to end that cycle—to give individuals access to care that is professional yet compassionate."

From toxicology testing and medical detoxification to psychiatric disorder stabilization over the long term, the center leaves no one behind.

Therapy is the foundation of the Centre's work. Counselling is conducted on a one-to-one basis with the individual, peer support and group healing through group meetings, and couples and family inclusion where they are taught how to rebuild trust and relationally strained relationships due to addiction or mental health problems.

Shattering Financial Barriers

The greatest asset of Harmony Therapy Centre is that it is within reach. With a partnership with SHA Insurance, clients can now receive good rehabilitation and mental health care without excessive financial burden. This has motivated many to arrive early—before sickness or addiction makes them relapse, end up in the hospital, or worse.

Looking to the Future

The Centre is not relying on rehabilitation alone. Already, plans are underway to build an expansive hospital facility offering inpatient and outpatient services. This expansion will combine curative medical care with therapy and rehabilitation in one roof—confronting clients with comprehensive healthcare treating both body and mind.

"This is going to change the game for Meru County," suggests the management team at the Centre. "We envision a center where patients detox, receive therapy, and have access to medical services without having to move from one center to another."

Preparations in top gear for Governor Tush Cup

reparations are in high gear for the highly anticipated Governor's Cup, now officially branded the Governor Tush Cup, a flagship project of H.E. Governor Mutuma M'Ethingia designed to promote sports, nurture young talent, and tackle pressing social issues across the county.

Building Meru Together



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Meru County launches climate resilience programme to support vulnerable households

s part of an effort to scale up climate resilience for its most susceptible populations, Governor Isaac Mutuma M'Ethingia launched a new phase of support under the Financing Locally Led Climate Action (FLLoCA) programme. The distribution includes thousands of material items intended to help households withstand environmental shocks and improve food security.

The county will also provide 8,125 water tanks for rainwater harvesting, 364 dairy goats to enhance nutrition and incomes, 1,000 LPG cylinders for clean cooking, and 1,000 kitchen garden kits to allow households to produce food locally.

Governor Mutuma explained that the program rides on the understanding that environment, water, and agriculture go hand in hand— when one sector is ailing, the others also suffer. "These are not handouts, but strategic investments in our people's dignity, health, and long-term sustainability," he said at the launch.

They are part of Meru's broader Climate Change Action Plan 2023-2027, a plan developed through wide input from the county's 45 wards to identify climate risks and reactions. The plan guides efforts such as FLLoCA and seeks to strengthen community resilience in environmental, agricultural, and water spheres.

At a recent Africa Climate Summit in Addis

Ababa, Governor Mutuma lifted Meru's story of local climate action, calling for collaboration to scale up county-led solutions in adaptation and mitigation.

The launch was attended by a cross-section of stakeholders, including the members of the Meru County Executive Committee, the County Attorney, and elected Members of the County Assembly led by Hon. Caleb Mutethia

(Meru Municipality). This show of support reflects how Meru leadership is placing climate resilience at the center of its development agenda.

Ever since Governor Mutuma assumed office in March 2025, following the impeachment of his predecessor, the county's trajectory has shifted towards consolidating public service, unity, and tackling environmental challenges head-on.

Meru County tightens crackdown on alcohol abuse near schools and villages

eru County has intensified its battle against illegal alcohol enterprises and harmful drinking culture, using blanket tactics to protect schoolchildren and make communities safe from the devastating effects of alcohol abuse. Underlying this campaign is a firm mandate: no bar, liquor store, or alcohol advertisement shall be permitted within a 300-meter radius of any place of learning. This rule, in line with a national order, is now being enforced across the entire Meru with renewed vigor, reshaping the social fabric of the county.

Protecting Children Against Early Exposures

Meru County Alcoholic Drinks Control Board Chief Executive Officer Dr. Mbaabu Muguna has been leading on-the-ground inspections. His inspectors, who carry tape measures, have been moving around neighborhoods to verify whether the billboards and outlets are in the requisite distance from schools. Any display, poster, or advert that is placed in close proximity to a school is immediately taken down

"Let our children grow up without knowing about alcohol," Dr. Muguna said while out on one of the patrols. "Protecting them from early exposure is protecting their future."

Booze marketing has been glorifying boozing even among kids over the decades by setting up boards and posters intentionally visible near school entrances. By forbidding such practices, Meru seeks to safeguard its students from the lure of alcohol as well as from its self-destructive tendencies.

Rogue Bars Shutdown

Enforcement has crossed the advertisements. Since January 2025, Meru County shut down nearly 200 bars that had been running either illegally without a license, selling illicit brews, or breaking safety and hygiene regulations for the last eight months.

Civilian residents have been central to this crackdown, grumbling against illegal dens that have encouraged alcoholism, destroyed families, and increased insecurity. Consequently, the Alcoholic Drinks Control Board worked in cooperation with police and community leaders to raid, examine, and revoke licenses of unruly establishments.

"Alcoholism is not a health problem alone; it

is a social catastrophe," stated a local elder in Igembe, whose neighborhoods experienced a number of dens recently demolished. "Families are disintegrating, young men are idle, and children are withdrawing from school. We welcome the County's firm stance."

Aligning With National Priorities

The ban of alcohol outlets near schools by the county aligns with a 2024 Ministry of Interior directive banning licensing of bars within 300 meters of schools. Meru is one of the leading counties in enforcing this directive to the letter and at all of its

branches, proving that county leadership can catalyze national ambitions for health and safety at a faster pace.

Community-Centered Approach

Apart from dens closing, Meru County is also encouraging rehabilitation and responsible action. Owners of pubs are requested to send alcoholics to rehab centers instead of exploiting their condition.

Campaigns of public education are also underway, reminding citizens of the health and economic dangers of alcoholism. Statistics indicate 23% of job losses in the county are due to alcoholism, and 4% of alcohol-caused deaths. Such harrowing statistics are the reason that Meru's antialcohol campaign is half as much about saving livelihoods as lives.

Results Already Visible

The campaign has already had ripple effects. There is less truancy due to alcohol in schools, and parents say that they feel reassured by the fact that their children are no longer walking past alcohol-selling establishments on the way to school.

Communities have also seen improved security as illegal dens have been shut down.

The Road Ahead

While Meru has registered progress, the County Government concedes that the war is not yet won. More patrols are in the offing, closer collaboration with national security agencies is being driven, and communities are being empowered to be vigilant.

"Our goal is not just to regulate, but to transform lives," Dr. Muguna emphasized. "We are determined to ensure Meru becomes a county where children can learn in peace, families can thrive, and communities are free from the chains of alcohol abuse."

A Model for Kenya

Meru's multi-pronged strategy—combining strict enforcement, community engagement, public awareness, and national alignment—offers a blueprint for other counties grappling with the scourge of illicit alcohol.

While the crackdown takes place, one thing is certain: Meru County is not merely shutting down bars and taking down posters. It is building a future where kids are free to dream beyond the shadow of alcohol, and where people regain their dignity, health, and productivity.



eru County, led by Governor Mutuma M'Ethingia, is launching a roads and energy revolution agenda to increase connectivity, trade, and clean energy production. From rural link roads to Africa's first hybrid energy park, the county is setting new standards for infrastructure development.

County Link Roads Upgrade Gathers Speed

The Department of Roads, Transport, and Energy has embarked on a grand program of grading all link roads under the management of the counties to gravel levels. According to the CEC Member David Baariu, the program is intended to enhance accessibility, reduce travel time, and enable farmers, traders, and school-going children to travel safely even during rainy seasons.

"We are resolved to unlock every corner of Meru," Baariu said during an inspection tour of development projects in Nyaki West Ward. "Roads are the lifeline of our economy, and once we improve connectivity, everything else—trade, education, health—follows."

Meru currently boasts a road network of about 1,260 kilometers, much of which still needs regular upgrading. The new program puts emphasis on grading, gravelling, and maintenance of feeder roads connecting the rural areas to major towns and markets.

Lighting Up Meru: Security and Growth

Besides roads, the county is investing in street and security lights to promote safety and stimulate business. The Roads and Energy docket has been busy with rapid repair of vandalized high-mast floodlights and installing new ones in busy towns and trading centers.

"These lights are beyond visibility," Baariu said. "They offer security, extend the hours of doing business, and grant residents a perception of safety. It is about keeping our towns vibrant even at night."

The lighting project has already transformed several wards, enabling night economic activities and reducing crime rates. Traders at the local markets report more lit-up places have boosted customers' confidence, with some businesses remaining open later.

Meru County Energy Park: A Continental Game-Changer

Taking a longer-term view, Meru is set to position itself as a renewable energy hub. In partnership with Hewani Energy, the county

will be home to the Meru County Energy Park, a 220 MW utility-scale hybrid power plant comprising 200MW of wind and 20 MW of solar.

It is expected that the construction will commence in early 2026, which will be the first of its kind in A frica. Once completed, the park will not only generate clean energy, but also

jobs, investments, and a reliable supply of power to households and industries within the county and beyond.

According to the county investment promotion agency, the project aligns with Kenya's vision of 100% clean energy and positions Meru as a leader in the green energy revolution.

Accountability Through Stakeholder Forums

To ensure transparency and efficiency, the county government has been holding regular stakeholder forums, recently at Kamunde Hall in Meru Town. The forums, which bring together county officials, technical teams, and members of the community, discuss progress and provide feedback on the provision of infrastructure.

Success of these projects depends on public

participation," Baariu clarified. "We want citizens of Meru to know what is being done, contribute, and hold us accountable."

A County on the Move

Meru's simultaneous investment in roads, security lights, and renewable energy is laying the groundwork for inclusive growth. Farmers will enjoy greater access to markets, students safer walks to school, and businesses stable energy to expand operations.

he chilly September morning at Meru University of Science and Technology was alive with energy. The event brought together an unlikely but powerful mix—journalists, county leaders, NGOs, students, religious groups, community elders, and everyday citizens.

"Journalists are not just storytellers," said one


survived an abusive relationship, the run was personal. "I once felt alone, ashamed, and unheard," she shared, tears welling in her

eyes. "Today, I see I'm not alone. This run is proof that we can speak out and heal together."Statistics paint a grim picture. Meru County continues to grapple with rising cases of teenage pregnancies, intimate partner violence, and mental health struggles—especially among young people and journalists dealing with trauma on the job. Events like this one aim not just to highlight the problems but to inspire practical solutions.

County officials pledged greater collaboration with media and civil society groups to combat these challenges. Calls for more safe spaces for survivors, accessible counseling, and policy enforcement rang out through speeches and banners.

As the runners crossed the finish line, sweaty but smiling, the message was clear: this was more than a race. It was a step toward healing, justice, and a stronger, safer Meru.

The Meru Press Club hopes this run will become an annual tradition, reminding everyone that awareness is the first step to action—and action is the only way to lasting change.

From drought to dignity: Isiolo communities celebrate new era of clean water access

fter decades of walking long distances in search of unsafe water, residents of Isiolo's arid villages can finally celebrate. From Gafarsa and Iresa Boru in Garba Tulla Ward to Modogashe in Sericho Ward, clean, piped water is now a reality thanks to bold investments by the Isiolo County Government.

For over 60 years since independence, families in these communities depended on seasonal streams, shallow wells, and water pans that were often contaminated and unreliable. Now, new water infrastructure has turned desperation into relief, marking what many describe as a transformative milestone in Isiolo's history.

The Gafarsa & Iresa Boru Breakthrough

The commissioning of the Gafarsa-Iresa Boru water project gave villagers access to clean water for the first time ever. Women and children, once burdened with walking over 10 kilometers daily for unsafe water, now fetch it within steps of their homes.

Residents hailed the development as lifechanging, with experts noting its potential to strengthen health, education, and pastoral livelihoods while also easing community conflicts often fueled by water scarcity.

The Modogashe Water RevolutionIn Modogashe, Governor Abdi Ibrahim Hassan Guyo fulfilled a key campaign pledge, delivering clean water to over 90% of households. The project features a 100,000-

cubic-meter steel water tank, solarization, and a standby generator, ensuring uninterrupted supply even during dry seasons.

Key institutions including Sericho Secondary School, Omara Primary School, the local mosque, and a Technical and Vocational Training institute are already benefitting.

Two main water kiosks have been set up, and piping to households is ongoing, with the water department promising access at nearly every doorstep.

The fully county-funded project involved drilling a new borehole and rehabilitating an existing one. Using modern technology, the

county ensured water depth, quality, and quantity were accurately assessed before drilling. The Modogashe water office also received a facelift with new infrastructure including a pump house, solar stand, reinforced walls, and gabions for flood protection.

Broader Countywide Water Agenda

he Modogashe success story is part of a wider county initiative to tackle water scarcity. Similar projects are underway in Akadeli, Daaba Juu, and Kakili, while the Dadach Bassa water project nears completion, with

seven kilometers of pipeline already laid. Collectively, these projects signal a countywide shift toward sustainable water management — a cornerstone for improving health, education, and economic growth in arid regions.

A New Chapter for Isiolo

Development experts argue that these projects will not only reduce waterborne diseases but also free up time for children to attend school and women to engage in economic activities. Access to water also promises to reduce conflicts between pastoralist communities and wildlife over scarce resources.

As taps flow in places where thirst once ruled, Isiolo County is steadily moving toward a future where no community is left behind in the quest for clean, reliable water."This is more than just a development project.

It is the restoration of dignity, the opening of opportunity, and the beginning of a new chapter for our people," said Governor Guyo during one of the commissioning ceremonies.

oung people must seize opportunities, innovate, and uphold discipline if they are to shape a better future for themselves and the nation," AscentChange International Co-founder Deborah Kangai said.

Speaking during a well-attended empowerment seminar at PCEA Ibiriga Youth Fellowship in Tharaka Nithi County, Ms. Kangai told the more than 300 youth present that Kenya's social and economic progress depends on a generation that is self-driven, creative, and solution-oriented.

"The government alone cannot create enough jobs for all. We need young people who can think beyond employment and become job creators. Innovation, discipline, and service to the community are the building blocks of success," she added.

The seminar, organized by AscentChange International in collaboration with Ibiriga Parish Youth Fellowship, brought together youth leaders, clergy, experts, and community members to address key issues affecting young people, including unemployment, drug abuse, and unhealthy relationships.

Drug and substance abuse prevention expert Kelvin Wafula cautioned that addiction often begins subtly through peer pressure, poor parental guidance, and the influence of unregulated social media platforms. He stressed the importance of early intervention.

"When we start talking to children in primary and secondary schools about the dangers of drugs, we save future generations from a lifetime of struggle. Combating this problem requires a united front government, parents, churches, and community groups must work together,"

Reverend Patrick Kirimi urged the youth to uphold moral values and guard their personal relationships, noting that distractions and unhealthy engagements can derail their education and career ambitions.

The forum was praised for complementing government youth empowerment programs such as the Ajira Digital Program and the Kenya Youth Empowerment Project, which aim to equip young people with digital skills and entrepreneurial knowledge.

Local leaders noted that such grassroots

initiatives play a critical role in bridging the gap between policy and practice, ensuring that young people in rural areas are not left behind in national development plans.

Organizers pledged to hold similar events in other parts of the county, with plans to

include mentorship programs, business incubation training, and networking opportunities with potential investors.

Tensions boil over as youths torch Njuri Ncheke shrine in Igembe Central

traditional Njuri Ncheke shrine in Baibariu, Igembe Central, has been reduced to ashes after a group of angry youths from Kiutine and Baibariu villages stormed the site and set it ablaze.

The young men, carrying branches and chanting slogans, accused the council of elders of widespread misconduct, including physical assault, forceful initiation of unwilling youth into the Njuri Ncheke ranks, and even cases of sexual assault against women. These accusations, which have circulated in whispers for months, exploded into the open with the dramatic act of arson.

The destruction of the shrine, considered sacred by Njuri Ncheke, has triggered shockwaves across Meru. Njuri Ncheke is one of the most powerful traditional councils in Kenya, known for arbitrating disputes, safeguarding culture, and enforcing discipline within the Ameru community.

Elders Deny Wrongdoing

In response, the Njuri Ncheke elders have strongly denied the allegations leveled against them. They described the arson as a "heinous and shameful act" that disrespects the traditions and heritage of the Ameru people."The shrine is not just a building—it is a symbol of our unity and culture. Burning it down is a direct attack on the community," one elder lamented.

The elders, however, shifted the blame to the

national chair, Linus Kathera, claiming that he orchestrated the incident to weaken their authority and sow division among the ranks of Njuri Ncheke. The accusation has added another layer to the already complex web of local politics surrounding traditional institutions.

Rising Tensions Between Youths and **Elders**

This is not the first time tensions have flared between Njuri Ncheke and sections of the younger generation. In recent years, some youths have accused the council of being out of touch with modern realities and using traditions as a cover for exploitation and

Analysts point out that such confrontations are a symptom of deeper cultural shifts: the struggle between maintaining tradition and adapting to contemporary values of human rights, gender equality, and freedom of choice.

Echoes of Earlier Incidents

The Baibariu shrine burning is not an isolated event. Similar incidents have been reported in Tigania region, where locals expressed anger at the elders over alleged coercive practices.

Earlier this year in Nyaki East Ward, North

Imenti, a church congregation burnt down a Njuri Ncheke shrine, claiming young people in the area were being forced to join the council against their will. The incident highlighted how cultural, religious, and generational tensions continue to shape the debate around the relevance of Njuri Ncheke in modern society. These repeated incidents underscore a growing pattern of discontent, suggesting that the friction between tradition and modern values is no longer confined to one corner of Meru.

What Next for Njuri Ncheke?

The incident has sparked debates within Meru about the future of Njuri Ncheke. Some community members argue that the council must reform, address the allegations transparently, and open itself up to scrutiny. Others fear that the destruction of shrines and attacks on elders could erode the cultural backbone of the Ameru people.

Local authorities are now under pressure to investigate both the allegations of abuse and the violent retaliation that led to the burning of the shrine. Police presence in the area has reportedly been increased to prevent further unrest.

As the dust settles in Baibariu, one thing is clear: the uneasy relationship between tradition, youth, and modern society in Meru has reached a boiling point, and how the community navigates this crisis could define the role of Njuri Ncheke for generations to

Dual TVET training to bridge skills gap and combat food insecurity

he new dual Technical and Vocational Education and Training (TVET) model is being hailed as a transformative solution to Kenya's persistent skills gap and growing food insecurity.



The dual training model, which integrates 50% classroom instruction with 50% handson industrial training, is being rolled out across TVET institutions in Mt. Kenya East and West. Stakeholders say the Competency-Based Education and Training (CBET) system aims to produce work-ready graduates and improve agricultural productivity.

Dr. David Mwangi, National Chair of the

Kenya National Training Institution and Chief Principal of Nyeri National Polytechnic, said the dual TVET system ensures students receive industry-relevant skills by learning directly from companies.

Speaking during a sensitization forum to over 20 institutions in Meru town, he said industries will place students for the practical phase of training starting January.

He said TVET PS Dr Esther Muoria and Education CS have been on the forefront advocating for the implementation of the model."Kenya cannot develop without relevant skills. This model ensures quality and relevance, equipping graduates to fit into the labour market," said Dr. Mwangi.

He also praised the government for reducing assessment fees for certification of skilled individuals from KSh 30,000 to just KSh 1,500–3,000.National government's Meru and Isiolo County Director, Muhammed Hassan, emphasized the model's potential to rebrand agriculture among the youth by

offering hands-on exposure to modern farming technologies."Farming used to be for the elderly.

This model will make youth passionate about agriculture, improving food security," he said.

Industry representatives have also welcomed

the initiative. Njoki from Mt Kenya Dairy noted that companies are already hiring topperforming trainees. "Universities should borrow from this model to merge theory with field experience,' she suggested.

Jane Ngunjiri, representing the coffee sector, added that the training builds practical skills, knowledge, and positive attitudes, allowing learners to later train others in the community.



Meru County sets all-time revenue collection record as Gvn Mutuma rolls out ambitious 2025/26 development plan

eru County has recorded a record revenue collection in history, making it one of Kenya's fastestrising devolved states in development planning and financial management.

The county had registered KSh 1.148 billion in own-source revenue for the 2024/25 financial year, according to official data, up from KSh 961 million in 2023/24. The KSh 187 million rise, or nearly 20% year-on-year increase, is



the largest revenue raised in Meru's history.

Digital Transformation and Enforcement Drive Success

The increase has been attributed to deliberate reforms under Governor Mutuma M'Ethingia's administration, including the adoption of digital and cashless payment systems that closed loopholes for revenue leakages, enhanced accountability, and made service delivery easier for citizens.

Finance Executive Board Member Monica Kathono added that 32.6% of the income was gained in one quarter alone, a clear sign of growing efficiency and confidence in the system on the part of the public. She also pointed to higher staff morale, enhanced enforcement, and increased community awareness as being essential to the record results.





griculture: The Backbone of Meru County's Transformation

Meru County agriculture is not just about filling the stomach anymore—it has become a driving force for economic transformation, job creation, and poverty eradication. From the fertile Mount Kenya slopes to the thriving market stalls of Maua, agriculture has not only fed households but also fueled enterprise, innovation, and hardiness.

AThriving Agricultural Foundation

Meru is one of the most crop-diverse counties in Kenya. The farmers in Meru produce a range of crops—bananas, Irish potatoes, maize, beans, sweet potatoes, and yams for local consumption, besides cash crops such as avocado, coffee, tea, miraa, and macadamia for generating revenue. Other crops such as millet, green grams, sorghum, rice, and pyrethrum further contribute power to the agricultural basket of the county.

Livestock production is also robust. Meru is among Kenya's top milk-producing regions, and dairy farming leads the livestock sector. Farmers own cattle, goats, sheep, pigs, and rabbits, and poultry production—from chickens to turkeys—is also continuing to increase. Fish farming has gained momentum, and tilapia and catfish are being bred in fishponds, and better beekeeping is turning honey production into a true agribusiness.

Partnerships Driving Growth

For this transformation to happen. Determined individuals, county leadership with vision, and intentional government intervention have been key drivers. The County Government has joined hands with farmers through Common Interest Groups (CIGs) and SACCOs, promoting publicprivate collaborations and policies that focus on food security and sustainable development.



Strategic collaborations have also driven the industry. The Meru County One Health Unit (COHU) is working to improve the health of humans, animals, and the environment through multisectoral interventions. Partnerships with institutions such as Meru University of Science and Technology (MUST), seed traders, and KEPHIS have exposed farmers to climate-smart agriculture

and new technologies.

Other notable initiatives are:

KOPIA Kenya Program scaling up Irish potato and indigenous chicken production.

OCP Group financing soil testing for improved fertilizer use.

State Department of Livestock (SDL) establishing feedlots for improved livestock management.

National Agricultural Value Chain Development Project (NAVCDP) improving avocado, banana, coffee, dairy, and potato value chains.

ABDP (Aquaculture Business Development Programme) training fish farmers on climateresilient production methods.

Safeguarding Livestock: Mass Vaccination

In a step of bravery to guarantee animal health and boost farmer trust, the Meru County has launched a countywide program of immunization of over 268,000 cattle.

The exercise, which is spearheaded by the County Executive Committee (CEC) for Livestock and Agriculture, Janaro Gatangugi, is the largest in the area. It aims at safeguarding farmers' livestock against deadly livestock ailments that threaten food security and economic stability.

Speaking to the roll-out, CEC Gatangugi highlighted the importance of the campaign:

"This mass vaccination campaign isn't just about protecting cattle—it's about protecting livelihoods. With over 268,000 cattle vaccinated, we are ensuring milk production, maintaining household incomes, and solidifying Meru as a livestock hub."

Animal health officers have been stationed across all sub-counties to ensure maximum coverage, with particular focus on reaching farmers in remote and arid areas of Meru.

Unlocking Value Through Bananas and Miraa

Concurrently, Meru County is pioneering value addition on its signature crops—bananas and miraa. Trade, Tourism, and Cooperatives CECM Rev. Carol Kaberia and Agriculture, Livestock, and Fisheries CECM Jenaro Gatangugi, and Director of Industries Joseph Mbeva, finally toured banana and miraa farms at Laare (Igembe North) and Mitunguu (Imenti South).

Farmers espoused new uses for their produce from miraa juice, chewing gum, and fibre products to food extracts from banana stalks. The county authorities were emphasizing the formation of cooperatives to access markets,

obtain better prices, and eliminate brokers' exploitation. Farmers can raise incomes and create more employment through value addition and organized marketing.

The tour also showcased the nearly completed County Aggregation and Industrial Park (CAIP) at Ruiri/Rwareera ward, 97%. Equipped with cold storage facilities, CAIP will find aggregation of miraa and banana, empower value chains, and minimize middlemen. The leaders echoed Governor Mutuma M'Ethingia's commitment to empowering farmers and challenged residents to invest in CAIPs once up and running.

Meru Seeks Global Partnerships

Meru's agricultural ambition is also attracting international attention. The County recently hosted a Nebraska, USA delegation to talk about strategic partnerships in agriculture and trade.

The discussions focused on investment in agribusiness, market connectivity for Meru's key exports such as coffee, avocado, and macadamia, and knowledge exchange. County government officials emphasized that these partnerships will open doors to new opportunities for farmers, improve value chains, and position Meru as a viable player in global markets.

The Nebraska delegation applauded Meru's progress toward modernizing agriculture and pledged to explore prospects for collaboration in technology, training, and commodity trade.

A County Harvesting the Gains

The fruits of Meru's agricultural labor are already visible. Farmers are yielding more, managing post-harvest better, and enjoying better market access. Value addition—processing of milk, bananas, miraa, and macadamia nuts—is earning more income and employment in the county.

Maybe more than anything, these interventions are equipping Meru farmers with climate resilience, so that agriculture will remain sustainable in the years to come.

The Ministry of Water, Irrigation, Environment, and Natural Resources, in its Climate Change Unit (CCU), is monitoring the implementation of a series of borehole projects to provide safe and clean water to tens of thousands of households.

Pipeline extension works continue in Muutiokiama borehole in Akachiu ward, Antuambui borehole in Kanuni ward, Kiraone Market borehole in Athiru Gaiti ward, and Mikinduri Market borehole in Mikinduri ward. Other works include masonry water storage tank construction and plumbing system construction in Thangatha ward, as well as a new irrigation water storage tank for the Michimikuru Irrigation Project in Kiguchwa ward.

"These projects are all about building resilience. They give people water, farmers irrigation for their crops, and communities protection against the uncertainty of climate change," said CECM for Water and

Hybrid Solar Energy for Dairy Farmers

In Abogeta East ward, the county government is leading in clean energy adoption. The Climate Change Unit officially handed over the land for the placement of a hybrid solar system at Baranga Dairy Farmers Cooperative Society.

The cooperative, which has a membership of more than 600 members, will use the solarpowered system to manufacture animal feeds. The project, funded under the Climate Change Resilient Investment project under the FLLoCA program, will minimize the energy cost, decrease the greenhouse gases emissions, and promote green energy usage in the agricultural sector.

"This demonstrates our commitment to climate-smart interventions that have a direct effect on our farmers," said Governor

Hospitals threaten to suspend SHA services as RUPHA decries state neglect

he Rural and Urban Private Hospitals Association of Kenya (RUPHA) has sounded the alarm over what it calls the government's systemic financial neglect, warning that Kenya's healthcare system is at risk of grinding to a halt due to massive unpaid bills under the Social Health Authority (SHA). At a joint press briefing in Meru, RUPHA

leaders representing more than 700 private and faith-based hospitals accused SHA of failing to reimburse facilities, leaving hospitals drowning in debt and unable to sustain operations.

RUPHA Chairperson Dr. Brian Lishenga revealed that since SHA's inception in October 2024, hospitals have submitted claims worth KES 93 billion, but only KES 50 billion has

been reimbursed.

This leaves KES 43 billion in unpaid SHA liabilities, on top of KES 33 billion inherited from the defunct NHIF — a total of KES 76 billion in pending bills."Despite a ministerial directive that reimbursements be made on the 14th of every month, this has not been honoured. Hospitals are owed KES 43 billion in unpaid SHA liabilities, and the sector is on the verge of collapse," said Dr. Lishenga.

Hospitals Issue Ultimatum

As the crisis deepens, private hospitals have now issued an ultimatum to the government: they will suspend services to SHA patients starting Monday, September 22, 2025, unless the arrears are cleared

This drastic move could leave millions of Kenyans unable to access treatment, given that private and mission hospitals account for nearly half of all healthcare services in the country.

Mismanagement and Discrimination Alleged

RUPHA further accused SHA of publishing

misleading information on its public portal and unfairly downgrading facilities and bed capacities, despite hospitals holding valid licenses from the Kenya Medical Practitioners and Dentists Council (KMPDC).

In counties like Mombasa, Kirinyaga, Embu, and Nandi — which are key pilots for the government's Digital Super Highway initiative primary healthcare reimbursements have stalled, leaving hospitals under-resourced and patients underserved.

RUPHA Vice Chair Rev. Joseph Kariuki accused the Ministry of Health of weaponizing fraud controls instead of addressing deeper issues such as the flawed proxy means testing model and unaffordable annual premiums that weigh heavily on Kenyans. "Hospitals are facing insolvency while the government delays action.

Patients are being denied care, healthcare workers are going unpaid, and some hospitals are sacking staff. If nothing is done, UHC will remain just a political slogan," said Kariuki.

Growing Crisis

With hospitals struggling to pay salaries and suppliers, RUPHA warned that continued neglect will cripple Kenya's healthcare delivery. The association urged President William Ruto's administration to fast-track payment of all pending NHIF and SHA bills to restore confidence and safeguard universal healthcare.

As the September 22 deadline looms, the standoff between private hospitals and the government threatens to plunge millions of Kenyans into a healthcare access crisis.



Bold plans to transform sports in the grassroots

The initiative is expected to level the playing field for youth in rural counties such as Meru, Isiolo and Tharaka Nithi, who often lack access to modern training facilities.




